Edgar Allan Poe: *Buried Alive*

Wednesday, December 6, 6:30

pm: Join us for a screening of *Edgar Allan Poe: Buried Alive*, recipient of a production grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The film was shown on PBS as part of their *American Masters* series in fall 2017. The screening will be followed by Q and A session with Eric Stange (producer/director), Paul Lewis (film commentator and Boston College Professor) and Megan Marshall (film commentator and 2014 Pulitzer Prize winning author of *Margaret Fuller: A New American Life*).

Edgar Allan Poe: Buried Alive draws on the rich palette of Poe's evocative imagery and sharply drawn plots to tell the real story of the notorious author. The film, featuring Tony Award-winning and Emmy-nominated actor Denis O'Hare, explores the misrepresentations of Poe as an alcoholic madman akin to the narrators of his horror stories. It reveals the way in which more than any other writer of his time, and even our own time, Poe tapped into what it means to be a human being in our modern and sometimes frightening world.

Gallery: *Stars and Lights* by David Zapatka

For over four years David Zapatka has been on a photographic odyssey chasing America's iconic lighthouses on the darkest of dark new moon nights under brilliant stars. His show, *Stars and Lights*, aims to capture the nation's lighthouses before the government decommissions and darkens many more of these historical beacons. The series has been captured in David's newly

published book, *Stars & Lights: Darkest of Dark Nights*. Copies of the book will be available at the reception.

The planning and logistics of getting permission for nighttime access to the lighthouses presented many challenges. So too, did the location shoots which took place after dark, in unfamiliar grounds or waterways. A special twenty-foot water tripod was often deployed off the side of a boat and dropped to the bottom with the camera placed on the dry top platform protruding the water's surface. Not for the faint of heart, as an expensive camera and lens was placed barely feet above the waterline. At the moment the shutter was tripped, another of more than one hundred and thirty Northeast lighthouses became part of the record of these seldom seen nighttime lighthouse images.




Newton Talks is an oral history project that is being conducted through the
